### Sundays Message

December 6, 2020

This is where the good news starts – the good news of Jesus the Messiah, God's son.

Yes, It began just as the prophet Isaiah had written: "Look, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, and he will prepare your way. He is a voice shouting in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord's coming! Clear the road for him!'" Mark 1:1-3 NLT

What? No baby Jesus? Where's the wonderful, Silent Night, Holy Night? All is calm.

No, just Bang! Action! Mark is telling us that that's what John the Baptist was like to the Jewish people of his day. The ministry of John the Baptist burst in upon the world. Many had been looking for a sign from God, but they hadn't expected it to look like this. Many had wanted a Messiah to lead them against the Romans, but they were NOT expecting a prophet telling them to repent.

What a wake-up call! Every year at the time of Passover, the people of God recited, they remembered the Exodus from Egypt. Remembering how God had rescued them from bondage, bringing them through the Red Sea across the wilderness to their promised land. Along with the Creation account it's the most important story in the Old Testament. But, this John the Baptist character, what is going on?

New Testament Scholar NT Wright, "But instead of simply hearing the words and remembering the story, John was turning it into a drama, a play, and telling his hearers that they were the cast. They were to come through the water and be free. They were to leave behind 'Egypt' - the world of sin in which they were living, the world of rebelling against the living God. They, the Israel of the day, were looking in the wrong direction and going in the

wrong direction. It was time to turn round and go the right way (that's what repentance means). It was time to stop dreaming and wake up to God's reality. This is your story." Yes, the Messiah was coming, John was getting people ready. Dr. Paul Rees, "The Gospel is neither a discussion nor a debate; it is an announcement!"

Last week we talked about Keeping Watch as we wait. We wait to celebrate that wonderful Silent Night, Holy Night; but we wait with eager expectation Jesus Second Coming. We are to be the ones who, like John the Baptist, who are calling the world into this amazing story. We, just like Israel in John's day, are the cast. We are all a part of this drama! But the world sleeps.

It reminds me of a modern-day parable that I happened to reread this week. It is a little book titled, The Dream Giver, written by Bruce Wilkinson. The sub-title states the purpose of the book, Following Your God-Given Destiny. But the first couple of paragraphs of the parable so wonderfully describe our sleeping world today: Not long ago and not far away, a Nobody named Ordinary lived in the Land of Familiar. Every day was pretty much the same for Ordinary. In the mornings he got up and went to his Usual Job. After work, he ate almost the same dinner he'd eaten the evening before. Then he sat in his recliner and watched the box that mesmerized most Nobodies on most nights. Sometimes, Best Friend came over to join Ordinary in front of the Box. Sometimes, Ordinary went to his Parents' and they watched together. For the most part, not much happened in Familiar that hadn't happened before. Ordinary thought he was content. He found the routines reliable. He blended in with the crowd. And mostly, he wanted only what he had.

John is bursting, once again, on the scene today; "Prepare the way of the Lord!" "Repent, and believe the Good News!"

The Good News is that Jesus takes all of us Nobodies named Ordinary living in the Land of Familiar and changes us into the most precious Somebodies in the world. We are part of the family of God by grace through faith. There are no Nobodies or Ordinaries in God's family. The Son of God is far too valuable to die for a nobody.

Turning to our first reading for today, 2 Peter 3:9, "The Lord is not slow in keeping his promise, as some understand slowness. Instead, he is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance. There are no ordinaries or nobodies, the Lord wants all people to be saved." This is our story too. The Lord is waiting for us. Perhaps more than any other time in our lives, the world is crying out and open to the Truth. The wilderness is dangerous, filled with temptations, distractions, and lies. Jesus says, Follow me! I will lead you through. It is time for us too, to stop dreaming and wake up to God's reality. In the apostle Peter's first letter he offers instructions while we wait and watch. 1 Peter 4:7-11; "The end of all things is near. (Keep watch!) Therefore, be alert and of sober mind so that you may pray. Above all, love each other deeply, because love covers over a multitude of sins. Offer hospitality to one another without grumbling. Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms. If anyone speaks, they should do so as one who speaks the very words of God. If anyone serves, they should do so with the strength God provides, so that in all things God may be praised through Jesus Christ. To him be the power for ever and ever. Amen."

This does not sound like Nobodies in the land of Familiar doing Usual Jobs. This is the people of God empowered by Him to love and serve the precious somebodies who are saved by His wonderful grace. We proclaim this truth

boldly to our friends and neighbors. The Lord wants all people to be saved. This is not, this cannot be a humdrum routine existence. It is living in purposeful and meaningful service to our Lord and Savior. Mark is calling us today to ACTION! He is telling us to Prepare the Way of the Lord, Jesus is coming again. Amen.

### PREPARE YE

A SERIES OF SPECIAL SERVICES FOR Advent

### Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Isaiah 40:3

In this worship series for Advent, we contemplate the many ways we prepare ourselves for the coming of the Christ Child on Christmas, taking cues from the psalms of old and from those whom God chose to play a part in the story of our Lord's birth. As we draw near to the manger bed of our Savior from sin and death, our hearts prepare him room for his everlasting love.

WEEK 1: PONDER: We consider ways in which we can ponder the meaning of the birth of our Savior through the reading of Scripture and through reflection. Mary serves as a model for us in this pondering in the Annunciation. Theme verse: "We ponder your steadfast love, O God, in the midst of your temple." Psalm 48:9

WEEK 1: PRAY: We think about ways in which we can take more time during this season to communicate to our God through prayer as we wait for Christ. Zechariah, who went to the temple to pray, serves as an example for us of how hard that waiting in prayer can be. Theme verse: "But as for me, my prayer is to you, O Lord. At an acceptable time, O God, in the abundance of your steadfast love, answer me." Psalm 69:13

WEEK 1: PRAISE: We celebrate the upcoming arrival of our Savior through songs and shouts of praise as we prepare for him. Elizabeth, in her greeting of Mary, provides a benchmark for rejoicing with others over the good news of salvation in Jesus, even as we wait. Theme verse: "Sing praises to the Lord, O you his faithful ones, and give thanks to his holy name." Psalm 30:4

WEEK 1: PROCLAIM: We contemplate how we can prepare ourselves and others for the arrival of Jesus through our proclaiming. John the Baptist stands as the forerunner of all future proclaimers of Christ and gives us the courage to use our own voices to proclaim our devotion to the One who is born to save. Theme verse: "The might of your awesome deeds shall be proclaimed, and I will declare your greatness." Psalm 145:6
